
MILL OFFICIAL IS LAID TO REST

TONOPAH, Oct. 24.—(Special).—Martin A. Williams, superintendent of construction for the Tonopah Extension, who was buried here today from his late residence was one of the most efficient mill builders on the continent. In 1902 he was on his way to supervise mill building operation for the Alis-Chalmers Company in South Africa, starting from Bisbee, Ariz., where he completed a large installation and at San Francisco received a message countermanding his departure on account of the Boer war which precluded any industrial activity.

The message stated that one, Uri B. Curtis, of Tonopah, wanted a millwright for a three months' job and instructed Williams to report. That is how he landed in Tonopah in 1902. The three months extended into twenty-two years. For the last eight years the deceased was employed by the Tonopah Extension.

The funeral exercises were conducted by Mrs. A. C. Mead, according to the ritual of the Christian Science church.
